RUSSIA DENOUNCES POWERS' SCRAP OF PAPER POLICY

Dramatic Appeal Made By Britain To Forget The Past

M. MAISKY DARES FASCISTS TO END 'KEEP OUT' PACT

LORD PLYMOUTH, BRITAIN'S FOREIGN UNDER-SECRETARY, FACED LAST NIGHT WITH A DECLARATION BY RUSSIA WHICH SEEMED TO BE A DEATH-BLOW TO THE NON-INTERVENTION PACT, MADE AN URGENT PLEA TO THE 27 NATIONS GATHERED AT THE FOREIGN OFFICE TO 'LET BYGONES BE BYGONES' AND TO OBSERVE THE 'KEEP OUT' PACT FROM NOW ON.

It was a five-hour meeting of bitter accusations, tense drama and grim rivalry which was forced to a crisis when Russia dealt the conference a technical knock-out.

M. Maisky, Soviet Ambassador in London, tabled a declaration which with ruthless force accused the Fascist Powers of having already intervened in the war, and said:—

"The non-intervention agreement is an empty, torn scrap of paper. It has ceased in practice to exist.

"The Soviet Government cannot consider itself bound by the agreement to any greater extent than the remaining members of the conference."

Thus Russia avoids accusation of having wrecked the conference by walking out, and hurls back on Germany, Italy and Portugal the responsibility of an open breach of neutrality.

But Russia's future plans are wrapped up in the ambiguity of a diplomatic sentence, which reads:—

"WE WILL STOP RUSSIAN ARMS"

Declares Berlin Daily Express Staff Reporter BERLIN, Friday.

Germany will unite with Italy to prevent Soviet Russia from sending arms to Spain by either the Baltic or the Mediterranean.

This declaration was made to me tonight by a Government spokesman as soon as news was flashed to Berlin of Russia's declaration in London.

"Germany will allow no cargoes of arms to be shipped through the Baltic. It may be necessary to search Soviet ships," he said.

"The Soviet Union sees only one way out of the situation created—to return to the Spanish Government the facilities to purchase arms outside Spain... and to extend to the participants of the agreements the right to sell or not to sell arms to Spain."

M. Maisky, as soon as the meeting closed at 9.5 p.m., hastened to deny that his Government had withdrawn from the conference and it was stated that Russia would be represented on the sub-committee which meets today.

Lord Plymouth, after his plea to the delegates to kiss and make it up, started the committee by saying that the British Government had evidence of its own that there had been leakages of arms to both Spanish Government and insurgent forces, writes the Daily Express political correspondent.

Mr Guinness obtained a divorce from his first wife last year, citing Prince Aly Khan co-respondent.

Dr. Gekus Cobb, rector of St Ethelburga's, is well known for his views on Divorce Law reform.

Mr Guinness said to me: "Although I brought the divorce action I count in the eyes of the Church as a 'divorced person' who is not eligible to marry in a church."

"Sir Harry gave me to understand that the closure would only be temporary."

She sighed as she spoke of Carton and all that it meant to her to leave it.

"It is such a beautiful old place. It seems a shame it should remain empty. I love it more than I can tell."

"We all hope that one day the castle will be open again."
